CPD

This has seen numerous events held both externally and at the new Alexander room facility. Council decided early in the year that CPD would become a major focus for the Association and it should be now possible for Members to achieve their entire CPD requirement through ADASA and Federal ADA. This should provide an excellent member benefit.

Sally Queale has worked hard over this year to coordinate the events, which number approximately 35 and has done a wonderful job of bringing them all together. Events

included – Social events such as the Golf Day and Tennis Day. The Recent Graduates Committee held 7 events over the year and these were well attended. Other events included the Michael Melkers course, the Infection Control day, Limestone Coast Partnership, Record Keeping and Dr Terry Pitsikas talking about PHI. The latter of which were entirely free to members.

ADASA office staff

At the beginning of my Presidency I was heavily involved in the process of finding a new CEO as Peter Gardner wished to retire in June of 2015. I spent time with the HR committee and a sub-

committee of Council to go through the process of finding a new CEO with the help of Hender Consulting. Community Relations Officer

Dr Jim Ball has worked very hard over the year and has helped members who have experienced problems with patients. Jim is dedicated and diligent and we are very lucky to have him perform what I would consider to be a difficult role.

SADS

The Association has had very fruitful and regular meetings with CEO Dr Geoff Franklin and General Manager of the Adelaide Dental Hospital Anne Pak-Poy. We have had discussion over funding for Dental Schemes which is currently in limbo but hopefully by the time of reading this report approximately 10 million dollars would have been released into the private sector. The relationship with SADS continues to strengthen as evidenced by their involvement in the Limestone Coast Partnership.

AHPRA

The year saw 4 meetings with AHPRA where we were able to discuss many things of relevance to our members. Fortunately the dental notifications and applications committee for AHPRA has a low work load and they have indicated to us that the percentage of notification is fairly low and not increasing.

University of Adelaide – Dental School

It was wonderful news that the Adelaide Dental School won the tender for the new 30 year partnership with SA Health. This will see the relocation of the Dental Hospital to the School

of Medicine and Allied Health on North Terrace near the new Royal Adelaide Hospital. There are obviously teething problems with this in regard to scheduling of students and work practices. Time will be able to help resolve these.

Professor Lindsay Richards was appointed the new Dean of the Dental School and we congratulate him on his appointment.

Council

Council has now moved to 6 weekly meetings as the advent of the internet has made communication much easier. I would like to thank Council for the time and effort that they have put in over the last year.

SOL

In December of last year I had a meeting with the Honourable Christopher Pyne – Minister for Education who wrote on our behalf to the appropriate Minister about our concerns regarding dentists being on the Skilled Occupation List (SOL). Fortunately the Federal Government have seen fit to remove dentistry from the list.

Conclusion

During my Presidency I have found it a rewarding experience and realise that there are an enormous number of external forces that are bearing down on dentistry. These include areas such as government regulations, private health insurance, and market forces. We live in a challenging time as dentists but hopefully we can all adapt and thrive into the future in the best interests of our patients.

CEO's Report

The year has seen many changes as well as achievements.

This year, ADASA played a crucial role in ensuring members complied with changes to Child Safe Policies set down by the Department for Education and Child Development. ADASA's development of a Child Safe Policy template enabled practice managers to ensure all relevant team members understood their obligations under s8 and s11 of the Children's Protection Act 1993.

ADASA has also been active in encouraging members to consider the benefits of Dental Practice Accreditation. Accreditation is an internationally recognised evaluation process used to assess the quality of care and services provided in a range of areas, including health care. To support members in this process, ADASA – together with QIP – has developed a range of accreditation templates and

resources aimed at keeping the Dental Practice Accreditation process simple and cost effective.

Early in the year ADASA was provided the opportunity to comment on the Draft Health Care (miscellaneous) Amendment Bill 2015. Our concerns with the draft Bill was that it did not stipulate that dental surgeries in which intravenous sedation is performed be exempt from private day facility licencing, as they are in other states. In communications our concerns were addressed and agreed amendments were made to the draft Bill.

More recently, highly publicised infection control breaches interstate served as a reminder to ensure infection control procedures were up to date in our own practices. This year, ADASA hosted a number of Infection Control Seminars, with a focus on sterilisation procedures, to help members maintain the highest standards of dental care.

This, and our other achievements would not be possible if not for the combined efforts of many. To our staff, the Council and the members of our committees, I would like to extend my sincere thanks for your work over the past year.

I would also like to recognise and thank, ADASA CEO of 5 years, Peter Gardner, for his contribution to the Association. Peter has had a long association with the dental industry, working as the Registrar of the Dental Board before beginning his role with ADASA in 2010.

The progress we've seen in the past year is very exciting and we look forward to sharing our continued journey with you, into 2015-16 and beyond.







onorary Treasurer's Report

Another year has passed and the trend of solid financial returns has continued with a net profit of \$131,641 for the financial year ended 30th June 2015. Several years of conservative management has seen the Association return operating surpluses each year. It is wonderful to know that ADASA is in good financial health, but it is also important to put these funds back into member services and facilities and Council is very supportive of this.

Branch subscriptions were indexed to CPI as in previous years and remained our main source of income. The revenue from Dental Insights advertising and from ADASA events has increased on previous years and thanks must go to Sally Queale for her efforts with this. Council is supportive of further developing our events program, including continuing to bring speakers from interstate or overseas, so please feel free to suggest ideas for speakers or events you would like.

An Investment Committee has been created this year with the intention of establishing and maintaining a conservative, balanced portfolio. The investments are still being finalised but the strategy is a five-year time frame with the aim to increase our portfolio value in excess of inflation, allowing the Association to maintain its financial position for the future. This committee is separate to the Audit and Risk Management Committee which oversees the fiduciary and legal compliance of ADASA.

The retirement of Peter Gardner and the appointment of Dr Samantha Mead as our new Chief Executive Officer saw a brief handover

period employing both CEOs. This has caused an increase in our annual wage costs compared to previous years, but is unlikely to occur again for many years.

The financial statements have been independently audited by Duncan Anderson and Paul Gosnold from BDO and passed easily due to the excellent work of Julie Herring our branch accountant. We also thank Duncan and Paul for their diligent work and have reappointed BDO for next year also. For those of you closely examining our financial statements, there is a significant change in our cash flow with Guild Insurance now collecting their premiums directly. This shows as a large net decrease in our cash flow (in excess of one million dollars) however our net asset position on our balance sheet has shown an overall increase.

Many people give their time and effort to help ensure the financial health of ADASA. Dr Jack Gaffey and Lisa Hickey (our independent accountant from Hood Sweeney) deserve thanks for giving of their time and knowledge as members of our Audit and Risk Management Committee, as does Dr Anthony Smerdon who has been a wonderful President. The Association is also very fortunate to have exceptional, dedicated staff. Thank you to the whole team, but in particular: Julie Herring for her thorough, detailed reports and impressive accuracy; Dr Samantha Mead for her governance, guidance and photographic memory of our constitution and By-Laws and Gerry Hunter for her excellent minutes and ability to keep us all organised behind the scenes.

The ADASA Public Relations Committee has enjoyed a productive year given that we did have a slow start. This was mainly due to the fact that we did not have the benefit of a Public Relations Firm since the contract with "Corporate Conversation" expired in October 2014.

At the start of the year we had the assistance of Dr Jane Ford, Policy, and Research Officer who worked as an "in house" Public Relations Officer. This was only a temporary measure and as a transition, until a more permanent arrangement was made and Dr Ford was instrumental in arranging media training for both myself as Chair and the ADASA President, Dr Anthony Smerdon. The aim was to allocate all public oral health messages and media activities to me as the spokesperson and the more political messages to our ADASA representative and President Dr Smerdon.

Emily Griffiths has since been appointed as the ADASA Public Relations Officer on a part time basis and has proven to be effective in working closely with the Public Relations Committee to generate media coverage for oral health issues and also on working on internal communications to keep our members informed.

The Committee for 2015 comprised of me as Chair, Dr Peter Alldritt, Dr Alex du Bois, and Dr Agnetha Valladares. This year we saw the loss of Dr Cathryn Gill as a member and we look forward to her return in the future. Fortunately we have been able to

welcome a new member in Dr Jonathan Christo and at the time of preparing this report, we are in the process of securing another couple of members for the coming year. The meetings also included attendance by the ADASA President Dr Smerdon and both past CEO Peter Gardner and the newly appointed CEO Dr Samantha Mead and also Office secretary Gerry Hunter.

It is essential that the ADASA continues to be recognised as the authority on all matters relating to dentistry in this state. As a result, the Committee has been active in providing education and raising awareness of various aspects and issues facing our profession. It is our responsibility, as a profession, that we educate the public on basic oral health with a focus on prevention. Only in this way are we able to ensure that we are the first point of contact on all matters relating oral health and the dental profession amongst both our members and the general community.

The Public Relations Committee aims to ensure that we have constant and active contact with the public. This is achieved with planned activities and awareness campaigns targeting a focus group and the delivery of key messages in a proactive or in a reactive manner relating to any educational or political matters that may arise.

The Public Relations Committee has been working closely with ADA Inc. to establish positive health campaigns and work in collaboration with national oral health initiatives through an Oral Health Working Group. This has been managed under the coordination of Amelia Seselja, Oral Health Promoter, ADA Inc.

Throughout the year, the Committee responded to all requests for media interviews in radio, print and television ranging from topics that included oral health care and tips for oral hygiene, preventive dentistry, erosion and attrition, staining of teeth, the snaggle tooth fad and the pitfalls of do it yourself braces, to name a few.

Dental Health Week (DHW) 2015 was launched on Monday 3rd August 2015 and ran until Sunday 9th August 2015 with the theme "Sports and Oral Health" and the focus in this state was sports drinks and the mouth-guard policy. As always DHW received a large amount of media exposure on both a national level and also locally in South Australia. The radio attention throughout Australia was immense and also locally with interviews by

Dr Peter Alldritt, Chair Oral Health Committee ADA Inc. In South Australia, the ADA Branch achieved significant attention, not only on radio but also in print media. On Tuesday 4th August, 2015 the "Advertiser" featured an article on Page 15 which was titled "Hey Sport, you're drinking 12 teaspoons of sugar". This was a largely placed article which quoted me on behalf of the ADASA, and raised the lack of awareness of the potential dangers of sports drinks on oral health. The same report also referred to the joint campaign launched by the ADA and

Sports Medicine Australia regarding a "No Mouthguard, No Play " strict policy for all state codes and this was also backed by the Chief Executive officer of Hockey SA, Andrew Ellis. The "Seven Sporting Sins of Dental Care" were also noted as part of this feature.

On Thursday, the 6th August 2015, I was interviewed and featured on ABC 3 News and this was specifically about children's consumption of sports drinks and the importance of mandatory and professionally made custom fitted mouth-guards.

Throughout, the week, the website was promoted providing a wealth of information. The key message from the SA Branch of the ADA was not to let your sporting sins kick you in the teeth and it certainly encouraged all South Australian sports men and women to adopt better oral health care principles.

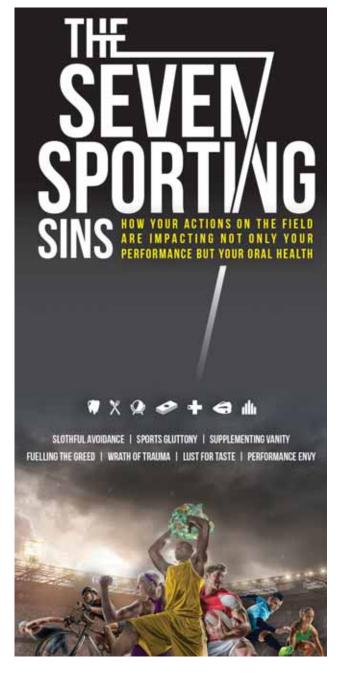

This year we have had a major success in that our revised Terms of Reference were finally approved by Council. The work involved in this revision was immense and we are grateful for the input provided by the President and also Dr Angela Pierce for her legal mind and suggestions. What this means is that Council has ratified our responsibilities which are now a little broader than they have been previously. This was circulated in an email to members about the changes in the By-Law 9.3 (amended version By-Law 9.4) of ADASA but essentially apart from investigating members' conduct, we have a general advisory role and also can now offer counselling for members who have received a complaint or enquiry or who have been the subject of formal investigations or legal action, should they wish. Another service which we can offer is the provision of clinical advice to the Community Relations Officers or members of ADASA staff who might need information urgently.

Fortunately, there has been very little in the way of formal complaints this year, and the Community Relations Officer (CRO) has continued to brief us on events at most meetings, and where necessary, the Review Committee has offered suggestions for resolving some issues. Advertising has not featured as prominently this year, but the vexed issue of patient expectations not being met has been at the forefront. Whilst the vast majority of members do not have the need for our services, it would seem that the lack of communication between practitioner and patient is still the cause for most action. A new

initiative this year is that we are presenting a short seminar to the final year students on record keeping and complaints handling.

By monitoring the types of enquiries that are received by the ADASA, and any subsequent complaints, we are able to monitor trends and from this we have been able to present articles for "Dental Insights" magazine on various topics, in an effort to help members. We are continuing this analysis to include year of graduation of the member concerned and also the location of the practice, again to see if there are any trends. If we can spot a trend emerging, hopefully we can address it before it becomes a major problem. As a committee, we are committed to the maxim, as in any disease, that "prevention is better than cure".

I extend thanks to my committee members mentioned above (and their families who accept their absence at meetings), also Peter Gardner, for the first part of the year, and latterly Dr Samantha Mead who advises on procedural matters at meetings, and Gerry Hunter, whose very able fingers are generally able to keep up with us as the Minutes Secretary.

The ADASA Recent Graduates Committee (RGC) had a very active year in 2015. The year started with the annual lawn bowls evening, co-hosted with the Adelaide University Dental Students' Society (AUDSS) at the Toorak Burnside Bowling Club. A perpetual trophy was awarded for the first time this year, adding a bit of light-hearted competition to the night.

For continued professional development, our popular study club program has further expanded from six meetings last year to seven this year. Our first study club meeting in February was on endodontics by Drs Khash Nassery and Fabrizio Damiani. Participants were given theory followed by hands-on activities with two different reciprocating rotary systems and three thermal obturation systems. Our April study club meeting was on dental implants. We had a team of speakers including dental technician Bob Westermann and Drs Bruce Robinson, Dieu Le, Mark Earl, John Schaefer, Will South, Nikki Sommers and Ed Bell. Our deputy chair Dr Stuart Renigers was instrumental in the development of this meeting and certainly did an excellent job in coordinating a large team of speakers, obtaining good feedback from participants. The June study club topic was targeted at the general membership with Dr Paul Sambrook presenting on dental therapeutics. There was a large degree of interest on this topic as attendees took the opportunity on the night to clarify any uncertainties in managing patients with newer therapeutic agents. The July study club on surgical extractions

was presented by Dr Janet Scott. This interactive evening involved both a lecture and hands-on exercises with Dr Scott and Dr Isaac Liau assisting participants with their flap designs on plaster models. The August study club presenters were Drs Brian Chee, Danny Ho and Kere Kobayashi. The three periodontists presented on recession, crown lengthening and periodontal maintenance and it was very well received. In September we invited the current paediatric registrars Drs Lloyd Hurrell, Gabrielle Allen, and Gwendolyn Huang who presented on case presentations and evidence based updates on paediatric dentistry. The October study club, yet to be held at the time of writing, will be a half day program on multidisciplinary management by Drs Alan Broughton, Jack Linn and Paul McHugh with all expectations that it would be an excellent way to end our study club program for 2015. The committee would like to sincerely thank all our speakers for their time and effort in assisting our members in their CPD endeavours.

September also saw our biggest event by attendee numbers to date, the Trivia for Timor at the Burnside Ballroom. This event was held to help raise funds for the East Timor Dental Program. After RGC's involvement in 2012, this year the RGC has once again worked with the AUDSS in organising this event. It was a genuinely fun-filled night and we have had excellent feedback from attendees. This event raised more than \$12000 in addition to donations by individuals to support the program. This was the result of tremendous time and effort invested by a team of dedicated RGC and AUDSS members,

contributions both big and small by numerous other contributors. The list of names is simply too long to list so the committee would simply like to say a big thank you to all those involved. The funds raised will certainly help many individuals in East Timor where there is a severe lack of access to basic dental care compared to Australia.

Our committee's other role is to facilitate the introduction of dental students into the dental profession. The annual "Learn from our experiences" event to final year dental students was once again held this year. Presentations by our president, Dr Anthony Smerdon, Joanne St Clair and Drs Mayank Dogra, Greg Miller, Angela Pierce, Michael Yuan, Lan Vo, Keng Soon Yeoh and myself covered a vast range of topics. These included the role of ADA, indemnity insurance, CPD requirements, RACDS pathways, experience in the first year after graduation, public vs. private practice, rural dentistry experience, employer's perspective of hiring recent graduates, employment contracts and overseas employment opportunities. The RGC has also been working with ADA Inc. and other states in the developing a national guide booklet for new graduates to assist our new colleagues in their transition into the workforce. This should be released by the time this report goes to print.

The year concludes with the annual cocktail party hosted by RGC at The Gallery on Waymouth. For the first time this will be held straight after our Annual General Meeting which should prove convenient for those intending to attend both events during this busy period of the year.

As I conclude my term as chair of this wonderful committee, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the following people. On behalf of the committee we would like to thank Gerry Hunter for meticulously preparing our meeting papers. Thank you to Catherine Waite for compiling the Employers' Guide and various bits and pieces throughout the year. 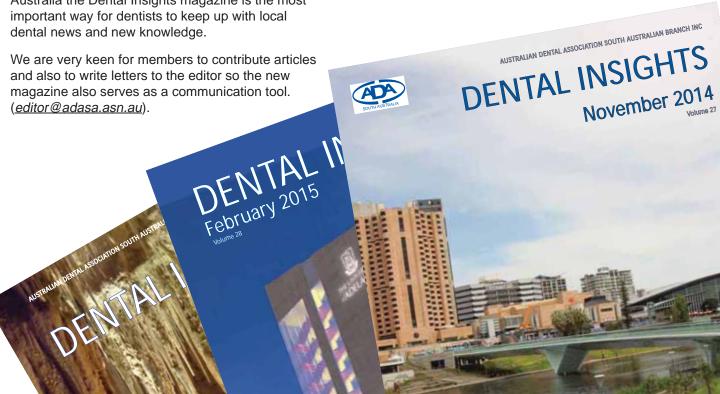

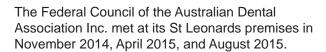
There has been some consideration in recent months in sharing articles with other interstate ADA branches and greater coordination of information.

REPORT FROM NOVEMBER 2014 MEETING

The major items covered at the meeting included the following:

FINANCE

The Treasure's report was received and accepted. Council reviewed the Auditor's report and financial statements and agreed to recommend to the Annual General Meeting the re-appointment of Crowe Horwath as both the Association's Auditor and ADA Foundation Auditor for the period July 2014 to June 2015. The Annual Accounts for both entities were approved and the direction was given to forward them to the Annual General Meeting of the Association for adoption.

A 2014 quarterly budget report was received and it was noted that progress for the 2014-2015 year was in accordance with budget.

The membership statistics report was received indicating the total membership of ADA Inc. (inclusive of student members) is 14,546 (2013 - 14,150).

ADA AWARDS

Following recommendations from the Honours and Awards Committee, Drs Christopher Daly, Mark Bowman, and Chris Mansfield were awarded the ADA Service Medallion for their services to the

Association. Dr Karin Alexander was awarded Honorary Life Membership. Federal Council extended their congratulations and gratitude to the recipients of these awards.

DENTAL HEALTH WEEK

A report was received regarding the success of the Dental Health Week 2014 Program. The report included reference to extensive media coverage received in respect of the 'Sugar Bandit' theme. Council has agreed to the adoption of the 2015 Dental Health Week theme being "Sport and Oral Health".

ADA STRATEGIC PLANNING

Having sought advice from all ADA Committees and reflecting upon the outcome of the 2014 Membership Survey the ADA's Strategic Plan was revised for the 2012-2015 period.

REGIONAL AND REMOTE ORAL HEALTH ADVISORY PANEL

Drs Simon Sheed (Convenor), Clare Bailey (WA), Ron Blake (Qld), Paul Hagley (NSW), Neil Lanceley (NT), Jessica Manuela (Tas), and Dimitra Vrastaminos (SA) were appointed to the Regional and Remote Oral Health Advisory Panel.

AUSTRALIAN DENTAL CONGRESS 2017

Federal Council decided the 2017 Australian Dental Congress will be held in Melbourne during the period 17 to 21 May 2017 due to a lack of available facilities available at the Adelaide Convention Centre which is currently undergoing renovation.

ederal Councillors' Report Cont'd

CONTINUAL PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Following a comprehensive review of the ADA's Continuing Professional Development (CPD) delivery, Federal Council approved for the Chief Executive Officer to commence negotiations immediately with providers for the renewal of media and library service arrangements. The CEO was asked to provide a report to Federal Executive on progress with a view to making a final decision in relation to future delivery of CPD Services at the April 2015 meeting of Federal Council. Federal Council also noted the views of members from the 2014 Survey and agreed with the sentiments in the report seeking to have CPD delivery by ADA Inc. optimised to ensure effective and economic delivery of CPD to members.

ADA POLICIES

In conjunction with the Policy Committee's three yearly review of all policies, amendments to 20 policies were adopted. A new policy document entitled "Salivary Diagnostics" was also adopted as new Policy Statement 6.31 within the category of dental practice.

AUSTRALIAN DENTAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION DIRECTORS

Drs F Shane Fryer, Karin J Alexander, and P Hugo Sachs were nominations appointed by the ADA as Directors of the Board of the Australian Dental Research Foundation.

FEDERAL EXECUTIVE ELECTION

Dr Rick J Olive was elected Federal President; Dr P Hugo Sachs – Federal Vice-President; Dr Terry K Pitsikas - Federal Treasurer; Dr R Mark Hutton - 1st Federal Executive Councillor; and Dr Neil D Hewson - 2nd Federal Executive Councillor.

All Standing Committees and appointment of Chairmen elections took place at this meeting. Federal Council extended congratulations to all successful candidates for positions on Committees. It also thanked those who made application and were unsuccessful for their commitment to the Association.

BRANCH PRESIDENT'S AND CEO'S MEETING

On the day prior to the Federal Council, Federal Executive, Branch Presidents, and Branch

CEOs met to discuss issues of concern and their respective activities since the last meeting. This provides all attendees with a wider perspective of what is going on in the ADA across the country as well as allowing for ideas to be exchanged on how best to address these issues. Many of the issues discussed are then conveyed to Federal Council for consideration.

REPORT FROM APRIL 2015 MEETING

The major items covered at the meeting included the following:

STAFF

The CEO presented a report setting out a revised structure for the ADA Secretariat. The revised structure was designed to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the ADA office and was endorsed by council.

BUILDING

Considerable interest had been expressed by developers in acquiring the ADA's premises. Federal Executive had requested the CEO to develop options for the ADA in relation to its premises. A paper was presented by the CEO in which he set out the options for ADA to consider in meeting its Key Responsibility Areas (KRSs) as per the ADA's Strategic Plan. The options included retaining the existing premises with no changes, selling the building and relocating to a site closer to Mascot Airport, moving to Canberra, or creating two offices, one in Sydney and one in Canberra.

Council decided that the best option would be to retain the Sydney premises and to set up a small office in Canberra. This would be actioned after the staff restructure.

FINANCE

The Budget report for the first eight months of the 2014/2015 year was circulated to Council and all finances were in accordance with budget. A brief preliminary report as to the financial outcome of the Brisbane Congress was also presented.

It was also resolved that the Federal Executive's remuneration be adjusted by the NSW CPI increase for the preceding year and the remuneration for the Editor of the Australian Dental Journal be similarly adjusted, effective January 2015.

ederal Councillors' Report Cont'd

A budget for the 2015/2016 year was presented and discussed. The Budget reflected the anticipated savings in salaries, committee meeting costs with the introduction of video conferencing, the revised CPD delivery plans and in IT. The budget was approved with an increase of a 2% even though membership services were increased.

MEMBERSHIP

The membership report revealed that ADA dentist membership had increased by 4% from the previous year, with 38% female and 62% male. Student memberships were steady at approximately 3000, and of these 53% were female and 47% male. The majority of members were in the 22 to 44 year age group.

MEMBERSHIP SERVICES.

A report provided an update on the ADA website redevelopment with emphasis on services that would be provided pursuant to the CPD portal of the website.

A progress report was provided in relation to the ADA Practice Survey. Many members had not completed the survey.

In responses to some complaints from members the next ADA Directory may include details of all members unless they expressly advise of their wish to be excluded from the Directory.

CONSTITUTION

The Australian and New Zealand Academy of Special Needs Dentistry were admitted to Category A Affiliation with the Association.

Amendments to the constitution relating to the payment of membership subscriptions by instalments, support for partners of deceased members, the provision of notices for the AGM and Special General Meetings and the date of appointment of Federal councillors were to be put to a Special General Meeting to be held on 28 August, 2015.

Certain amendments to By-Laws I, V, VI, VII, IX and Xii were adopted.

DENTAL HEALTH WEEK 2016

The Theme for the 2016 Dental Health Week campaign was confirmed as "Hormones and Oral Health".

CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

There was discussion in relation to the implementation of a new mode of obtaining and delivering electronic CPD to members. A CPD member has been appointed to the ADA staff. This was in recognition of the significant role that CPD delivery has among the ADA membership services. Working with the CPD committee the CPD manager will develop ideas as to topics required to be address for CPD, arrange for a variety of production companies to provide the CPD programme, supervise the clinical media advisor in relation to review of the product and then liaise with the CPD committee in respect of review and sign off of the programme.

AUSTRALIAN DENTAL CONGRESSES

The Brisbane Dental Congress was reviewed and it was reported that 4350 attended. The event saw the introduction of a new Congress "App", an exhibition that would rival any domestic or international trade show and the delivery of a CPD programme that received considerable accolade. A more comprehensive report was to be prepared.

In relation to the Melbourne congress 2017 it was confirmed that Dr David Curnow would be appointed as Congress Chairman, Dr Gordon Burt Vice Chairman, and Dr Ben Keith Chairman of the Scientific Programme Division.

SPC ON SUSTAINABILITY

The Chairman, Dr Brendan White, reported that the work of the committee was completed and recommended that the committee be wound up. Council thus disbanded the committee.

FDI

The ADA delegation to the FDI Annual World Congress in Bangkok was appointed with Drs Rick Olive (Delegate), P Hugo Sacks (Delegate), F Shane Fryer (Delegate), and Mr Robert Boyd-Boland (National Liaison Officer and Alternate Delegate).

POLICY

In conjunction with the Policy Committee's three yearly review of all policies amendments to 12 policies were adopted.

ederal Councillors' Report Cont'd

REPORT FROM AUGUST 2015 MEETING

The major items covered at the meeting included the following:

STAFF

A report from the CEO was presented advising on the implementation of the revised structure of the ADA Secretariat. The report indicated the implementation of the restructure had now been completed but was subject to ongoing review. Federal Council noted Judy Badans would be leaving her employment with the Association on 4 September 2015. Federal Council thanked Judy for her exemplary and dedicated long service of over 21 years to the Association.

FINANCE

The Budget was presented for the year ending June 2015. The outcome for the financial year was very close to the budgeted outcome. Income from the rental properties and investments continued to provide a healthy contribution to revenues and represented a substantial non-member contribution to income. The outcome saw improvement to the Balance Sheet of the Association.

MEMBERSHIP

A membership report was received which revealed ADA membership of practising dentists continued to increase. Of the student members, 56% were female and 44% were male. Practitioner membership continued to have female membership at 38% with male membership at 62%. The majority of membership continued to be in the 25-34 year old range followed by the 35-44 year old range.

MEMBERSHIP SERVICES

Reports provided in relation to the *News Bulletin*, *Australian Dentist e-Newsletter*, Website, ADA IR & HR Advisory Service, Pharma*Advice* indicated wide acceptance of these services by the membership. Considerable discussion and formulation of plans took place as regards the dental workforce and the conduct of private health insurers vis-a-vis health providers.

CONSTITUTION

Minor amendments to the Constitution have been proposed and these constitutional changes were referred for adoption at a Special General Meeting of the Association held on 13 November 2015.

Amendments to the By-laws were also passed. By-laws in relation to Committees, Standing Committees, Standing Orders, and Awards were adopted. In addition, there was a new By-Law XVI "Federal Councillors".

HONOURS

Federal Council congratulated the following recipients of Queen's Birthday Honours:

Paul Abbot AO, Frederick Clive Wright AM, Ralph William Neller AM, Anthony John Dickinson OAM, Bruce Graham Drysdale OAM, Peter Willoughby McKerracher OAM, and Philip Laurence Bliss OAM.

Honorary membership of the Australian Dental Association was granted to the newly appointed President of the New Zealand Dental Association, Dr Susan Gorrie.

DENTAL HEALTH WEEK 2015

Reports were provided indicating the extensive media coverage received in relation to the 2015 Dental Health Week Campaign. Highlights from the campaign included in excess of 150 media placements; a media reach for the week alone at 3.755 million Australians; and distribution of over 17,000 fact sheets. In conjunction, considerable publicity was achieved in respect of the ADA and Sports Medicine Australia joint production of their Mouthguard Policy. Federal Council noted the success of this year's DHW had exceeded past efforts and expectations and congratulated the Oral Health Committee and secretariat for their outstanding contribution to this event.

ADA FOUNDATION

Mr David Owen was appointed Chairman of the Foundation with Dr Karin Alexander appointed Vice-Chairman.

POLICY STATEMENTS

A new policy document entitled "Neurotoxins and Dental Fillers in Dentistry" was adopted as a new Policy Statement 6.30 within the sub category of Dental Practice. In conjunction with the Policy Committee's three yearly review of all policies amendments to 14 policies were also adopted.

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements cover Australian Dental Association South Australian Branch Incorporated as a single entity located and incorporated in South Australia. The entity is not-for-profit and the financial statements are presented in whole Australian dollars.

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements which have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985. The Association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

The Committee Members have determined that Australian Dental Association South Australian Branch Incorporated is permitted to apply the Tier 2 reporting requirements (Australian Accounting Standards - Reduced Disclosure Requirements) as set out in AASB 1053 Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards because it is a not-for-profit private sector entity that does not have public accountability.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the association in the preparation and presentation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

The financial report has been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by revaluations to fair value for certain classes of assets as described in the accounting policies.

(b) Revenue Recognition

Subscription revenue is recognised based on the period that is being invoiced.

Interest revenue is recognised when it becomes receivable on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Commission revenue is recognised based on the period that it is earned.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation

The depreciable amounts of all fixed assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(d) Income tax

Only non-member income of the association is assessable for tax, as member income is excluded under the principle of mutuality.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are recognised for all temporary differences, between carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and their respective tax bases, at the tax rates expected to apply when the assets are recovered or liabilities settled. Exceptions are made for certain temporary differences arising on initial recognition of an asset or a liability if they arose in a transaction, other than a business combination, that at the time of the transaction did not affect either accounting profit or taxable profit.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses only if it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

Current and deferred tax balances attributable to amounts recognised directly in equity are also recognised directly in equity.

(e) Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Liabilities for wages and salaries, including non-monetary benefits, annual leave and long service leave expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are recognised in current liabilities in respect of employees' services up to the reporting date and are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Other long-term employee benefits

The liability for annual leave and long service leave not expected to be settled within 12 months of the reporting date are recognised in non-current liabilities, provided there is a unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability. The liability is measured as the present value of expected future payments to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date using the projected unit credit method. Consideration is given to expected future wage and salary levels, experience of employee departures and periods of service. Expected future payments are discounted using market yields at the reporting date on national government bonds with terms to maturity and currency that match, as closely as possible, the estimated future cash outflows.

Defined contribution superannuation expense

Contributions to defined contribution superannuation plans are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

(f) Impairment

Non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised where the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount of an asset is defined as the higher of its fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

(g) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at banks, short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less held at call with financial institutions and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the tax authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of the acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense. Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included in other receivables or other payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cashflows on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(i) Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative information has been reclassified and repositioned for consistency with current year disclosures.

(j) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

Estimates and judgements are based on past performance and management's expectation for the future. There are no critical estimates and judgements used in the financial report.

(k) Fair value measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs.
